



People Arrived on Aegean islands




In 2022, people arriving is up 135%, compared to 2021. In June 39 boats was officially registered as arrived on the Greek islands, carrying a total of 1062 people. Arrivals has increased 147.6% compared to May, boats arriving is up 129.4%. Demographics on the islands: Men 59%, Women 13% and Children 28%

Total arrivals has increased 995% compared to same month in 2021. 207 boats started their trip towards the Greek islands in June, carrying a total of 6246 people. 39 boats made the trip, carrying a total of 1062 people, the rest, 168 boats, 5184 people, were picked up by the Turkish Coast guard, half of these boats had been pushed back by the Greek Coast Guard.

Total numbers so far this year



In 2022 680 boats have been stopped on their way towards Greece, 21.220 people have been arrested. Boats arriving on the Greek island has been reduced due to the Greek governments pushback tactics, boats picked up by TCG has increased for the same reason. Also the COVID-19 pandemic have had a huge impact. Population on the islands is 2500.






Arrivals and transfers by island

In June 401 people were transported to mainland, from the Greek islands. Transfers have decreased 14.9% compared to May, when 471 people were transported. In the last 12 months population on the Aegean islands has decreased by 67%, from 7.578 to 2.500 people. The Greek government have drastically reduced population on the Greek island, due to illegal pushbacks performed by the Greek authorities in the Aegean Sea.



Arrivals




Transfers

Population on each island



Official capacity on the islands is 16.230 people. Today's population is 13.730 people under max total capacity. In the end of June 2021 total population was 7.578, one year later its 2.500, population has decreased by 5.078 people in 12 months on the Greek Islands. In the last 12 months 20.441 people have been pushed back by Greek authorities.




It is the legal right of men, women or children to enter a country with or without paperwork, if they intend to apply for asylum. Pushbacks are the illegal practice of a state preventing them from doing so by stopping them entering its territory, or forcing them back across a border or into the waters of another state. The Greek government has hugely increased illegal pushbacks of refugees since March 2020, with some victims stating they have been beaten and robbed by Greek officials before being forced back across borders, or into the sea.

Total people 2022: 9.337




Total pushbacks 2022: 370

In June Aegean Boat Report have registered 81 pushback cases in the Aegean Sea, involving 2235 children, women and men who tried to reach safety in Europe. Many of them had already arrived on the Greek Aegean islands, arrested by police, forced back to sea and left drifting in life rafts, illegally deported by the Hellenic Coast Guard (HCG), on orders from the Greek government, so far there has been no reaction from the EU on these illegal atrocities.

Of 81 registered pushback cases in June, 41 of these cases was performed by using rescue equipment/life rafts, 1061 people, children, women and men was placed in a total of 64 life rafts, and left helplessly drifting at sea by the Hellenic Coast Guard, a systematic use of rescue equipment as a deportation tool. The Turkish coast guard and police picked up 5.184 people floating in the Aegean Sea and on Turkish beaches, in 168 cases in June, 48.2% of these cases people had been pushed back by the Hellenic coast guard.
